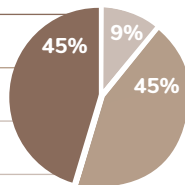

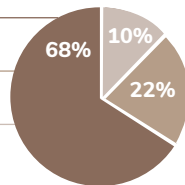

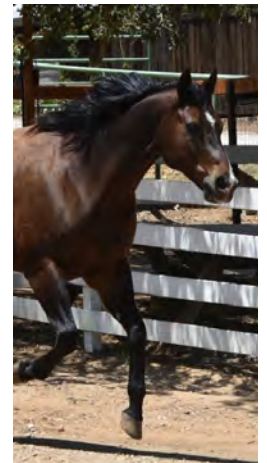
Meet Finn the Rider

Finn, 8, who has Autism Spectrum Disorder, has been at New Hope for more than 5 years. New Hope has ignited transformative changes in his language abilities, and he has flourished socially. His interactions with horses, volunteers, instructors, and fellow riders have facilitated effective communication, fostering confidence and a strong sense of belonging.



Meet Duke the Horse

A 2009 model quarter horse, joined the herd during 2023. Duke does not have just one best friend – he likes everyone! He was quite successful as a western pleasure horse until an injury halted his career. Thankfully, his previous owner knew Duke still had many gifts to give. He is an excellent therapy horse, loves people and is like a big puppy. Duke excels at introducing riders to the trot; the more daring riders thrill to his speed.



Meet Tonya the Veteran

Tonya is a medically retired, disabled Air Force veteran diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis during 2005 and paralyzed from the nose down in 2010. "This was a very dark period, and I wanted to quit many times," Tonya said. At New Hope, she met Cyclops, a one-eyed horse that "won my heart in seconds. He had no idea what disabled meant, and instantly licked me & my wheelchair. I left that day feeling calmer and accepted."



Meet Cyndy the Volunteer

Volunteers are the lifeblood of New Hope. No one exemplifies the giving hearts of our volunteers more than Cyndy Roark. For years, she has been assisting New Hope multiple days every week, and she and her husband, Dan, are big champions for all of our work. She is a friend and encourager to our teen riders, driving 100 miles round trip to bring to New Hope a rider who had moved out of the area.
