



Meet Tonya the Veteran

Tonya is a medically retired, disabled Air Force veteran diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis during 2005 and paralyzed from the nose down in 2010. "This was a very dark period, and I wanted to quit many times," Tonya said. At New Hope, she met Cyclops, a one-eyed horse that "won my heart in seconds. He had no idea what disabled meant, and instantly licked me and my wheelchair. Since then, Tonya has progressed to using a walker and transitioned from ground work to horseback.
